

Illinois: The Prairie State

Archaeologists aren't sure exactly when the first people arrived in what's now Illinois. However, they have uncovered ancient tools that offer a clue. Experts believe that humans lived here at least 10,000 years ago. Later, the first-known Native American tribes lived here. They include the Miami and the Illiniwek tribes.

The first Europeans to reach the area were French explorers Jacques Marquette and Louis Jolliet. They arrived in 1673. In 1717, Illinois became part of the Louisiana Territory. This was an area that was ruled by France. In 1763, the French gave up the region to Britain. After the American Revolution, Illinois became a U.S. territory. In 1818, it was declared the 21st state.

During the Civil War (1861-1865), there were no major battles in Illinois. But the state still sent soldiers to fight for the Union. This was a group of 23 northern states that were opposed to slavery. About 250,000 soldiers from Illinois fought in the war.

Disaster struck in 1871, when a huge fire swept through Chicago, Illinois. It destroyed much of the city, but a huge reconstruction followed. Ultimately, the Great Chicago Fire made Chicago into a modern city. It eventually became home to the world's first skyscrapers.

Why Is It Called That?

The name Illinois comes from the Native American tribe that lived there. The Illiniwek were also called the Illinois. The tribe was living on the land when the area was first explored by Europeans.

Much of Illinois was once covered in prairie grass. That's why the state's nickname is "the Prairie State."

Geography And Landforms

Illinois is bordered by Wisconsin in the north; Lake Michigan, Indiana and Kentucky in the east; Kentucky and Missouri in the south; and Missouri and Iowa in the west. The state can be divided into three regions.

The Central Plains region covers almost all of the state. It contains fertile land and low hills.

The Shawnee Hills region is in southern Illinois. It features higher elevations, rivers and forests.

The Gulf Coastal Plain is a hilly area at the state's southern tip. Some people call it Egypt. It is similar to the fertile area near Egypt's Nile River.

Wildlife

Black bears, bobcats and white-tailed deer are a few of this state's common mammals. Birdwatchers can look for quails, orioles, meadowlarks and bluebirds. The northern cardinal is the state bird. Scarlet snakes, snapping turtles and five-lined skinks are among the state's reptiles. Illinois' amphibians include tiger salamanders, western chorus frogs and American toads.

Box elder, red maple, pawpaw and sweet gum trees grow throughout the state. Its colorful wildflowers include Illinois bundleflower, Illinois rose and leopard lily.


Natural Resources

One of Illinois' best known natural resources is its rich soil. Some of Illinois' top crops are corn, soybeans and apples.

Fun Stuff

The state's official snack food is popcorn. It is often served with a combination of cheese and caramel. It's called Chicago-style popcorn!

Chicago's Museum of Science and Industry has many popular exhibits. It contains the world's largest pinball machine. You can also walk through a real German submarine. Younger visitors can visit a mini fairy castle.

Illinois is known as the Land of Lincoln. That's because President Abraham Lincoln lived there for 31 years. Today, visitors can see Lincoln's home and his tomb in Springfield, the state capital.
