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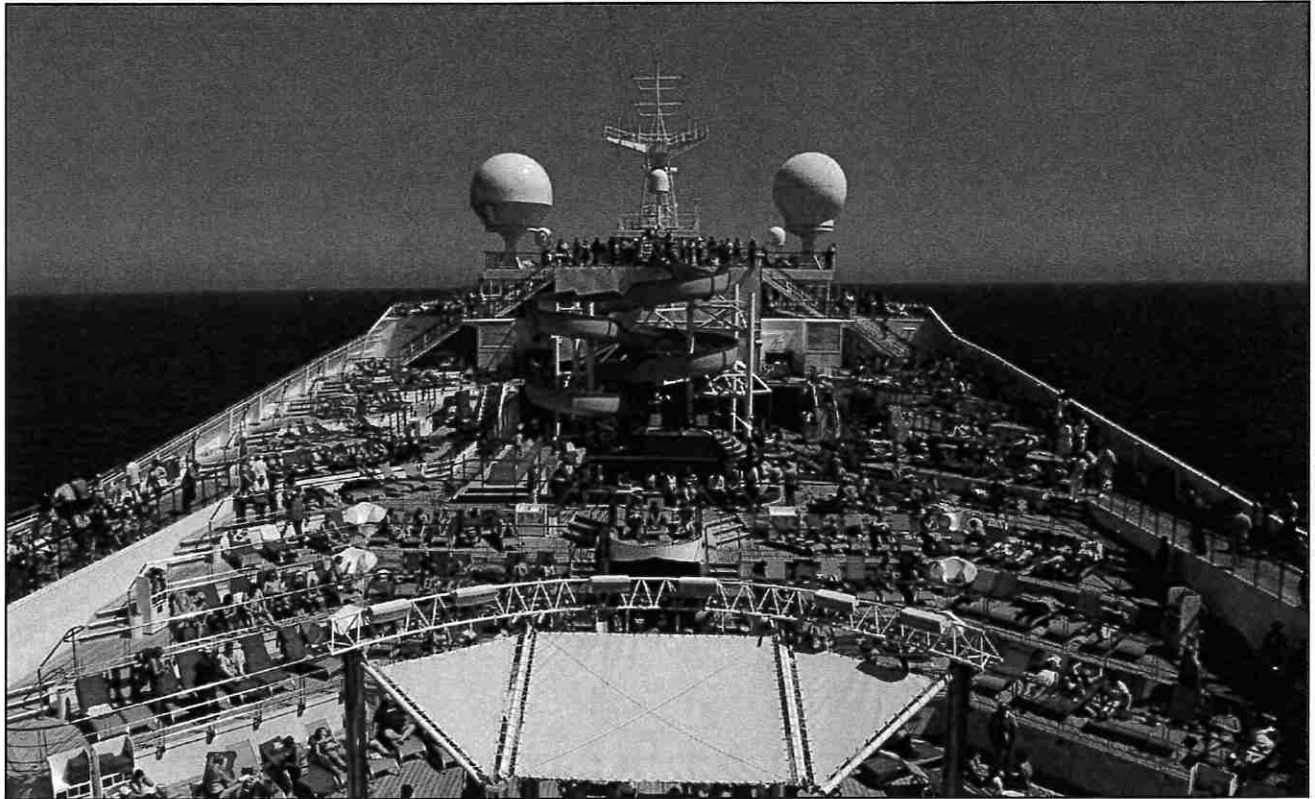

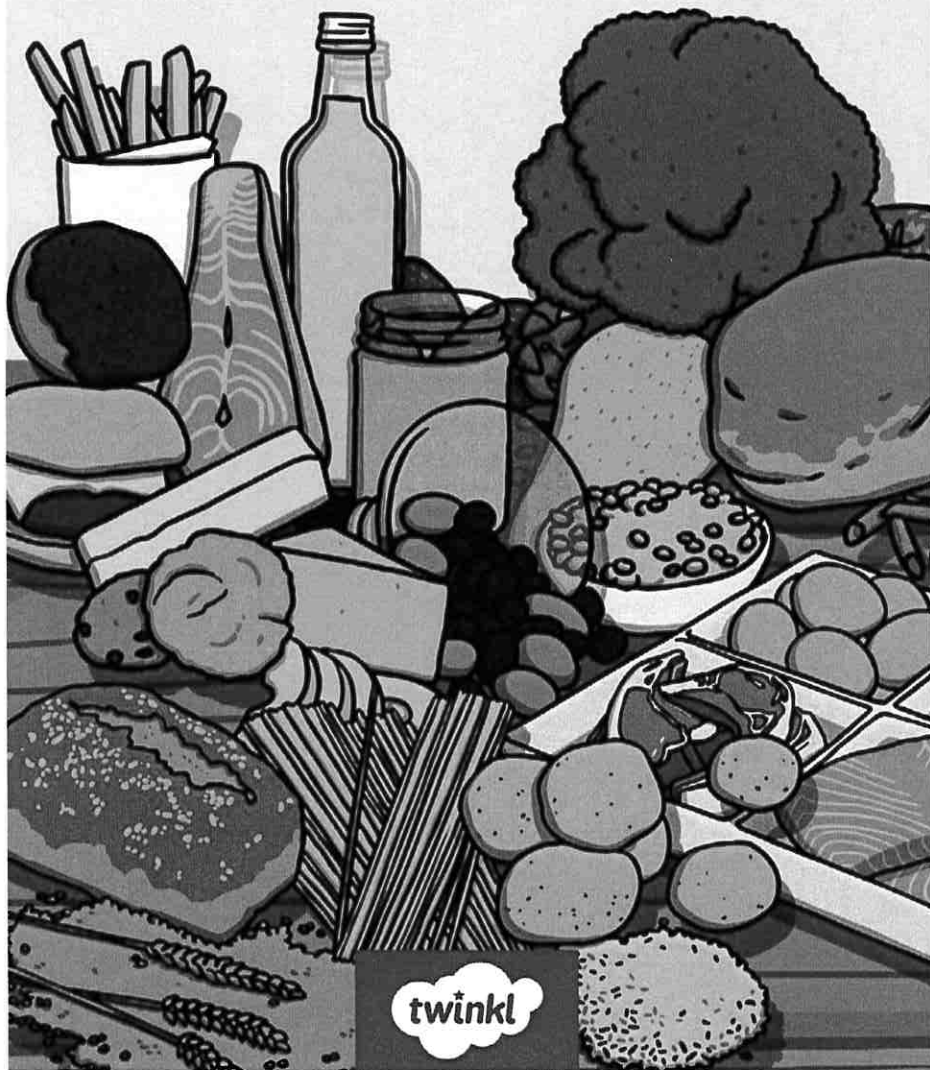

- After that, he escaped to Western Europe.
- He became a deacon for the church, then a priest and eventually a bishop.
- When he went back to Ireland, he taught people about Christianity and Ireland became a Christian country.

How Is St. Patrick's Day Celebrated in Ireland?

- St. Patrick's Day is a national holiday in Ireland.
- Most places are closed for the day.
- It is a Christian festival, like Christmas and Easter.
- Most Irish people begin the day by going to church.
- After this, they usually go to their local town or village for the St. Patrick's Day parade.
- The parades have lots of singers, dancers and other types of entertainment.
