Carnival of the Animals

The Carnival of the Animals (*Le carnaval des animaux*) is a musical suite written by the French composer Camille Saint-Saëns in 1886. The music was written as a joke for his students. It has since become one of the best-known pieces of classical music for children. Each of the 14 short movements is named for a different animal.

Tempo: the pace or speed of music.



- What animals would you draw to go with the music?




Movement V--The Elephant

From Book to Ballet



Composer Corner — **Camille Saint-Saens**

Charles-Camille Saint-Saëns was born in Paris, France in 1835. He began piano lessons at the age of two and came to be known as one of the outstanding child prodigies of his time. His talent was not limited to music, he also learned to read by age three and spoke French, Latin and Greek. His interests included mathematics, archaeology and astronomy.
